The Programme Implementation Procedure (PROCEDURE/DAPM/2022/003, Handbook, and UNICEF Emergency Procedures (PROCEDURE/EMOPS/2021-001) clarifies the need of start-up funding for CSO partners. This modality allows UNICEF to transfer an initial tranche of funding and 3 -months of supplies to CSO partners to meet acute, lifesaving needs while a more detailed programme intervention is being developed. The validity of the "start-up" funding agreement is three months, or until the more detailed programme intervention is signed, whichever is earlier.
